- ... telling what time it is in Sri Lanka, Togo, or Fiji



  - 3. Explain or define the feature in your own words.
  - 4. Find an example of that feature somewhere in the world and tell where it is. Write this information in the box.
  - 5. Tell what world region this example is in. Here's the challenge:
    You must find 2 examples in each of the 8 major world regions (NO MORE THAN 2 from each): Anglo America; Latin America; Western Europe; Eastern Europe and Russia; Middle East and North Africa; Sub-Saharan Africa; Southern and Eastern Asia; and Pacific Region.
