

All about Our World


The world in which we live is so very interesting! It consists of large land areas called continents and large water areas called oceans.

Be a Map Detective

As a map detective you will be searching for clues on a globe or a map. A globe is about the same shape as the earth. It is easy to see how the continents and the oceans are shaped. You can see from the globe that no part of the earth is really flat!



Clue #1: Look for the equator.

Look for a line that is halfway between the North Pole and the South Pole. It circles the globe. The **equator** is called the **zero parallel**. It is the starting place for numbering the parallel lines that go around the globe. Each of the other lines has a number of degrees from 1 to 90. The symbol for degrees is a small circle (°). The lines also have a letter, N or S, to show whether it is north or south of the equator. The equator line runs in an east–west direction.

Clue #2: Look for the prime meridian.

Look for lines that run in a north–south direction. They are called **meridians**. They are numbered from 0° to 180°, and each has a letter, E or W. The **prime meridian** is located at 0°.

Clue #3: Look for the oceans of the world.

Find the five large bodies of water called **oceans**. They are the Atlantic Ocean, the Pacific Ocean, the Indian Ocean, the Southern Ocean, and the Arctic Ocean.

Clue #4: Look for the continents of the world.

Use a flat map to help you answer these questions about the seven continents.

1.	What are the names of the continents?
2.	Which continents does the equator cross?
3.	Which continent is the smallest? Largest?
4.	Which continents are crossed by the prime meridian?
5	Which continent is located at 30° S and 130° W?
