




The *Daily Warm-Ups series* is a wonderful way to turn extra classroom minutes into valuable learning time. The 180 quick activities—one for each day of the school year—review, practice, and teach words that are commonly included on standardized tests such as the SAT.

From Latin *altercare* (to wrangle)


The **altercation** between the two teams erupted after the umpire made several bad calls.


opulent (adj)—demonstrating great wealth; extravagant


From Latin *ops* (power, help)

cryptic (adj)—secret; mysterious


From Greek *kryptos*

fiasco (n)—a failure



From Italian *fiasco* (a flask or bottle)


nocturnal (adj)—pertaining to the night; active at night



whet (vb)—to sharpen; to stimulate


From German *waz* (sharp)
